

#### President's Message

I am extremely proud to see the dedication of our members to raise awareness of our profession, celebrate the difference we make, and increase the public dialogue about what we do. Your efforts are extremely important and play a key role in the continued commitment of advancing our profession.

#### **Section Actions**

As many of you may be aware, the Arizona Section with support from the Society has been extremely busy this past month. Several members across all levels of the organization have sprung into action as a result of the proposed House Bill (HB) HB2613. This bill, as originally proposed, was aimed at deregulating both the geologists and landscape architect professionals within the State of Arizona. Members of ASCE along with several other professional groups were in attendance at the House Commerce Committee hearing on Wednesday, February 17th at 9:00 am. At this event, I spoke to the Chairman and Members of the Committee regarding our stance against the bill as proposed. Efforts since that date have removed the identification of landscape architects from the bill for deregulation, however at this time geologists are still identified. The following points were shared with the House to raise awareness on the matter:

- Downgrading the professional registration of geologists, landscape architects, or other professions could jeopardize Arizona's ability to obtain federal transportation funding. Design and construction observation of federally-funded transportation projects must be performed by registered design professionals. Federally-funded aviation and environmental projects also require the use of registered professionals.
- The Department of Administration, in a generic occupational licensing division, cannot replicate the Board's current structure, deep technical skills, and processes without significant expense to the taxpayers of Arizona.
- Creating a professional licensing program that is unlike that in any other state will only harm Arizonans' economic interests and undermine Arizona's competitiveness.
- Converting any profession to a title-only registration does nothing to protect the public. There is no
  "national bureau of registration or certification"—as stated in HB 2613—that licenses geologists, landscape
  architects or any of the other professionals regulated by the Board. Allowing anyone with an academic
  degree or certificate to claim "professional" status does not assure that registrants are qualified to take
  responsibility of design or construction.
- HB 2613 hurts the ability of registered professionals based or licensed in Arizona to do business in other states or countries. By reducing professional registration to title-only status, HB 2613 prevents Arizona registrants from getting reciprocity or comity licensure in other states.
- ASCE endorses, supports, and promotes professional registration of geologists and landscape architects
  to protect and enhance the health, safety and welfare of the public. Licensure assures the public that the
  practice of registered professionals is undertaken in a manner consistent with applicable codes of
  professional conduct. The licensure requirements of education, examination, experience and continuing
  professional development are intended to achieve that purpose.

Professionals across the state, with support from the Society of ASCE, are continuing to be proactive in raising awareness on these matters. Members of ASCE will be meeting with legislators for a drive-in event on Wednesday, March 02, 2016 from 10 am - 2 pm, at which time they will meet with both Arizona District Representatives and Senators to provide information related to the 2015 Arizona Infrastructure Report Card and issues pertaining HB2613.

#### House Bill 2613

House Bill 2613 (reference title: regulatory boards; licensing; revisions). This is a 91-page bill that would eliminate licensing of Assayers, Geologists, and Landscape Architects; plus, potentially move the State Board of Technical Registration under the Department of Administration. HB2613 was filed for the stated purpose of reducing the size and expense of Arizona state government by restructuring non-health professional licensing boards and initiating a legislative Study Committee to evaluate the transfer of all regulatory boards covered by Title 32, Ariz.Rev.Stat., (except health-related boards) to a new licensing and regulatory division created in the Department of Administration. BTR also enforces rules of professional conduct requiring technical competence and ethical business practices. BTR's vital protective function cannot be duplicated by social media rankings, word of mouth, or lawsuits filed after the fact by persons injured by negligent or unethical practice. The Department of Administration does not have the technical resources or skills to regulate the professional conduct of registered professionals. Request to stop HB2613 as it puts public health, safety and welfare in Arizona at grave risk by jettisoning an efficient professional regulatory program that does not require any general fund appropriations. Converting any profession to title-only registration does not protect the public. There is no "national bureau of registration or certification"—as stated in HB2613. Allowing someone with an academic degree or certificate to claim "professional" status does not assure that registrants are qualified to take responsible charge of design or construction.
