What is "good communication?" People always say the key to good relationships and effectiveness at work is "good communication." But what does this really mean?

Wikipedia says communication is from Latin *communicare*, meaning "to share." Dictionary.com notes it as "the imparting or exchanging information or news." And my personal favorite, "activity by one organism that changes or has the potential to change the behavior of other organisms."

There are 4 main categories of communication:

- Spoken or <u>Verbal</u> <u>Communication</u>: face-to-face, telephone, radio or television and other media.
- <u>Non-Verbal Communication</u>: body language, gestures, how we dress or

act, where we stand, and even our scent.

- <u>Written Communication</u>: letters, emails, social media, books, magazines, the Internet and other media.
- Visualizations: graphs and charts, maps, logos and other visualizations -(www.skillsyouneed.com).

Good communication can be hard to put your finger on. You want to get the intended outcome, based on the information provided, with minimal misunderstandings. Some would say good communicators **listen** carefully, **speak** or write **clearly**, and **respect** different opinions. They understand their audience and know the best method of getting information across; (Is it a detailed email? Or in person discussion? Or through visual aids?). Some would say its politeness, professionalism or a quick response.

Each person has their own preference, and sees information through their own unique lens, based on their specific background. This makes it difficult to define "good communication." Good communicators can adapt to all sorts of recipient's styles to **make a connection**. As you improve in this skill, to check if your message is understood, it is often helpful to have feedback from recipient(s) to communicate back what they believe the message is.

In our work, I believe, the more communication the better. We are like detectives collecting information and piecing clues together to find the best solution. As seen on tv, detectives will say "let me know if you think of anything, even if it doesn't seem important." I find that often the case for engineering. Each piece of information leads to a clearer picture of what is existing to account for in design and construction or what is needed to make the system operate better. This happens through distributing information often and by all 4 communication categories: (verbal, non-verbal, written, and visualizations), including: sharing of emails, design plans, as-builts, conversations with clients and operators, asking questions and talking about lessons learned based on your experience or someone else's. The more people you can loop in, often the better.

## **Branch Awards**

The Phoenix Branch is soliciting nominations for the following awards:

#### ASCE Phoenix Branch Government Civil Engineer

This award is presented annually to a distinguished civil engineer employed in the public sector, located in Gila County, Maricopa County, or Pinal County. The nominee must be an ASCE member in good standing and preferably a licensed professional engineer. Qualifications of the award nominees will be judged on the following:

- Sustained outstanding civil engineering performance in the public sector.
- Evidence of high character and professional integrity.
- Civic and humanitarian activities.
- A minimum of 15 years in public service as a civil engineer.
- Five of the 15 years at the senior administrative level.
- Currently employed in the U.S. public sector at the time of application submittal.
- Participation in ASCE.
- Letters of recommendation.

#### ASCE Phoenix Branch Project of the Year - Small and Large

This award is presented annually to one project with total design and construction cost under \$10 million and one project with total design and construction cost equal to or greater than \$10 million. Projects must be substantially completed in 2019. Qualifications of the project award nominees will be judged on the following:

- Engineering significance.
- Implementation of innovative engineering and construction techniques.
- Impact on quality of life and improvement of the performance of the infrastructure.
- Use of ASCE programs such as the Envision Rating System.
- Letters of recommendation.

Nomination packets are due January 6, 2020.
